ABOUT 4-H

4-H is an international youth organization involving more than seven million members in 80 countries around the world.

4-H in Canada began in Roland, Manitoba in 1913 as a Boys & Girls club – a community-based organization dedicated to rural youth.

In 1952 the name was changed to 4-H. Today 4-H reaches farm, rural and urban youth, focusing on leadership, personal and skill development including citizenship, responsibility and independence.

Purpose of Manitoba 4-H Council

Formed in 1951, the Manitoba 4-H Council coordinates 4-H programming throughout the province and provides participation in the policy-making process. Through a representative structure, the issues, needs and concerns of members, leaders and staff are assessed when decisions are made about 4-H programs in Manitoba. The council administers specific provincial programs and manages funds solicited through 4-H club donations and sponsorship. The Council works closely with its partner, Manitoba Agriculture, Food and Rural Development, in the development of individuals building rural communities.

The Manitoba 4-H Council operating procedures are based on its Constitution.

To develop capable and innovative community leaders through programs that stimulate thought, initiative and leadership.

VISION

4-H: A vibrant program blending tradition and innovation for a quality experience.

The Manitoba 4-H Council is supported by funds (cash and in kind) from many sources:

- Membership fees cover Insurance, member and leader travel opportunities, printing of The Banner and annual report, maintaining the Website and the annual audit and pro-rated donations to Council partners (the Roland 4-H Museum, the 4-H Manitoba Endowment Fund Foundation and the Manitoba 4-H Ambassadors).
- Program participation fees or event registrations contribute a small portion of the costs of 4-H Council
 activities.
- Companies, organizations, governments and individuals all sponsor events like member development programs, the Provincial 4-H Leaders' Conference, Provincial 4-H FunFest and the Provincial Communications Extravaganza.
- The Canadian 4-H Council arranges funds from some national sponsors for provincial support.
- Manitoba Agriculture, Food and Rural Development (MAFRD) supports the 4-H Council Board, its activities and
 events with cash. As well, MAFRD contributes staff time in Brandon and its area council offices and operational support to the Brandon office including office space and facilities (like copier, fax, phone and postage).

This year saw the introduction of an overnight event for Intermediate members only and, after a two-year break, the Provincial Leaders' Conference was re-introduced in November, held in conjunction with the AGM and fall Board Meetings. The many points raised in discussion between the Directors and PLC Conference delegates were formed into an Action Plan which became the basis of a new three year Strategic Plan for Council. Governance has also been a major focus this year as we sought to develop a workable Board structure for the move from a Representational Board to a Policy Board at the next AGM.

A lot of work has taken place on the Risk Management front too. A number of changes were implemented to simplify and streamline the Youth Protection Program and a comprehensive review of our policies and procedures has continued. In particular, three new Codes of Conduct were prepared for Members, Registered Volunteers and non-registered Volunteers, as well as a Conflict Resolution Procedure.

I also had the privilege of attending various events throughout the year, Japan Homestay program activities, Communications Extravaganza, Manitoba Outstanding Young Farmers Awards, Future Leaders Club Achievement and the Canadian 4-H Council AGM. I am so proud of all the opportunities we have to offer in our 4-H program; we truly have a wonderful program. I was also very honoured to chaperone the Manitoba delegates to the National 4-H Citizenship Seminar in Prince Edward Island this past April. It was rewarding to be among a group of outstanding 4-H members. To all the 4-H members who travelled to National Conferences this year, you did a wonderful job representing Manitoba.

The 2103-2014 4-H year was a very busy one and, as I reflect back, we have accomplished a great deal. I am very proud of all of our accomplishments and I hope that you are as well. I look forward to another successful and exciting year ahead.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

While the Centennial year celebrations had all but wound down in Manitoba during the last few months of 2013, a few development were still being coordinated through the national 4-H office. National 100th Anniversary sponsor, Enbridge, sponsored a card-building contest with many submissions from across the country and Chrysler Canada committed to one hundred \$1000 scholarships for 4-H members, which were awarded in 2014. In addition to the wrap -up of the 100th Anniversary, Canadian 4-H Council staff were very busy developing and unveiling the new Program Logic Model as the new organizational standard and several new programs and development were announced under this new model. Investigation into modernizing the national trademarked logo was also instigated as part of the evaluation of the 4-H brand under the new model.

With the end of the Centennial celebrations in Manitoba and in looking forward to year 101 of the 4-H program and beyond, the first several months of 2014 were a very proactive and productive time for the Council. Funding was secured to complete a major promotional campaign, as well as for strategic planning toward the development of a new, more functional Board governance model. Council also maintained its effort to develop new partnerships and create new opportunities for member programs and projects, both internally and externally as nontraditional demographics continue to be explored. Some of these development include: Provincial Leaders' conference, Intermediate Member camp, a pilot Future Leaders Club at the University of Manitoba and Aboriginal 4-H programming. In conjunction with the launch of the Future Leaders Club at the U of M and as the last official celebratory event of the Centennial year, MAFRD Minister Ron Kostyshyn attended the event to bring congratulations and sign the Proclamation of 4-H Month during a special ceremony in honour of the 100th year of the program. The 4-H program in Manitoba continues to benefit from an elevated

profile and heightened public awareness of the program, owing to the many successful celebratory events during the previous months. Nowhere was this more evident than when 4-H was asked for a leader and two members to attend a special evening in Winnipeg with Prince Charles and the Duchess of Cornwall during their visit to Canada. 4-H was the only youth program present and formally represented by youth at the event, a great honour indeed. Council was also awarded funding to lead a facilitated strategic planning process for the development of an industry-wide leadership development strategic plan. This project will be very beneficial for the 4-H program from a number of perspectives and is hoped to be the catalyst of several new opportunities for our members and leaders, as well as the continued increase of our profile in the province.

COMMITTEE REPORTS TO THE 2013 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

1. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee met several times in person, regularly by conference call and dealt with several matters via email.

- We worked on a new board structure, which will take place at the 2015 AGM when all is approved.
- We organized attendance at several events including the National Leaders' Conference, Young Farmers' Banquet, Ontario Leaders' Conference, Manitoba Agricultural Hall of Fame Harvest Gala, Royal Visit and YBF Homestay Program.
- We donated door prizes to several causes including the Farm Women's Conference, MB Association of Home Economists' AGM and Ag Days.
- We moved that 4-H Club fees are due within 30 days of enrolment.
- We worked on a club constitution, the three codes of conduct (Member, Leader/ Registered Volunteer, Parent/Non-Registered Volunteer) and other items that were part of our Hartley Non-Profit Consulting Inc. contract including Job Descriptions and Definitions.
- We facilitated an Organizational Assessment with Lavonne Kroeker of MAFRD in order to be eligible for Growing Forward 2 grant money.
- We reviewed our old strategic plan and created a new list of priorities for the Executive Director.
- Sherry Torchinsky, Carlie Whetter and Carrie Tapp discussed how technology could be used for Manitoba 4-H Council. A new website has been in the works.

2. Internal Development

The Committee of Past President, Executive Director and MAFRD Representative met in person a few times and dealt with other issues via email. The new Board structure was the main focus this year. The Aboriginal Partnership was also discussed.

3. RISK MANAGEMENT

Last fall, we began introducing our first improvements to the YPP screening process and continued making refinements during the year. Some of the results from last year's process are summarized below:

As you can see, some work needs to continue to have more of our leaders approved earlier in the program year. It will be interesting to see how these numbers change for this year with the early renewal included, as well as the increased emphasis on having a more timely completion of paperwork.

In the spring we launched the early renewal process but had very few packages returned. There were however more renewals returned by the beginning of this September than usual (46 versus 14). Renewals are still ongoing as clubs begin reorganizing for this year.

Last February, I was able to attend the National Leaders Conference in Ottawa. One of the main emphases of this conference was Risk Management. Between Dawn and myself, we were able to attend five different sessions. From which we were able to obtain valuable information and resources. Topics ranged from an overview of Alberta's YPP process to preparing a crisis communication plan to 4-H's insurance policy.

As part of the ongoing Risk Management Review, a number of Policies and Procedures were amended/ updated and three Codes of Conduct for Members, Registered Volunteers and non-registered Volunteers were introduced as well as a Conflict Resolution Procedure.

4. 4-H Member & Leader Opportunities

a) Leader Training

The Provincial 4-H Leaders Conference 2013 was held November 16 and 17 at the Ag. Extension Centre in Brandon. 60 leaders and Manitoba 4-H Council board members attended the two day event that was themed "100 Strong for 100 Years". The Conference was held in conjunction with the Council AGM. Speaker and workshop topics included farm safety, parental involvement in 4-H, working with Cloverbuds and governance and constitutions for clubs and councils. Guest speaker Kathleen Walsh shared her experiences from the 2013 Global Youth Ag Summit and leaders had an opportunity to ask questions of an Experienced Leader panel. Leaders also participated in an Advisory Group Workshop which facilitated small group discussion and big picture thinking. An evening banquet recognized 2013 as the 100th year of 4-H, with guest speaker Eleanor Penner sharing her Time Travel through 4-H.

b) Intermediate 4-H Member Event

A provincial event for Intermediate 4-H members (ages 12-14) was held April 12 & 13, 2014 at the Canadinn in Portage la Prairie. 33 Intermediate members attended the overnight event, along with six adult chaperones and two senior member

chaperones. Following the theme of "Who do you Think you are?"; members participated in workshops on first impressions, communication and body language. Keynote speaker Mark Essay energized the group with his presentation on making good impressions. Members also enjoyed swimming, a photo scavenger hunt and lip sync contest. Eligible members were also interviewed for a travel opportunity to the Alberta Intermediate Member Camp.

c) Member & Leader Travel Opportunities

This year 4-H Manitoba members travelled to the National Members Conference (Toronto), the US National Conference (Washington), the National Citizenship Seminar (Charlottetown) and the Alberta Intermediate Aim Conference (Westerose). Kendra Elliot from Pipestone Beef 4-H Club travelled to the United Kingdom with the Garfield Weston International Exchange Program and Naomi Gay from Bath, United Kingdom, was hosted in Manitoba. Kendra Elliot was also selected as Manitoba's applicant for the international Agriventure travel competition.

5. YBF JAPAN HOMESTAY

The York-Benimaru Foundation (YBF) / Manitoba 4-H Council (M4HC) / Manitoba Agriculture, Food and Rural Development (MAFRD) Home Stay Program has been in existence in Manitoba since 1987. The Home Stay Program was initiated in Manitoba, in part as a



result of agri-business contacts between MAFRD and Z. Kuroda Co., Ltd. in Japan.

The program fosters a connection between the two cultures, improves knowledge and cooperation and allows a greater understanding about the agricultural industry in Manitoba and Japan. A further objective is to develop stronger business ties between Manitoba agri-business and the Japanese market.

In the 28 year history of the program, 654 Japanese students and their chaperones have been hosted in Manitoba 4-H families' homes. 185 Manitoba members and chaperones have travelled to Japan.

MAFRD, in partnership with M4HC, plans and delivers the Manitoba Home Stay Program and selection/ orientation of 4-H members who travel to Japan. Both organizations provide a chaperone during the travel to Japan, sponsor the program through financial support and staff commitment and host the executive of the YBF, providing networking opportunities to further trade and partnerships between Manitoba and Japan.

The Japanese delegation of 20 students and two chaperones arrived in Winnipeg, Manitoba, and spent July 30 – August 1, 2014 in the following activities: a tour of the Canola Learning Centre at Kelburne Farms south of Winnipeg, a tour of a dairy farm, a tour of the Forks, supper and interpretive activities at Fort Whyte Centre, Journey to Churchill at the Assiniboine Park Zoo, a tour of the Manitoba Legislature hosted by Minister Ron Kostyshyn and a visit to the Lieutenant Governor's House where Their Honours the Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Lee hosted the students and chaperones.

The Welcome Party was held on August 1st in Domain at the Domain Community Centre where the host families met their students. The students and chaperones were hosted by 24 Manitoba 4-H families from 21 communities, August 2-15, 2014.

The annual YBF Thank You Party and the Sayonara Party were combined this year at the MNP PortagEx Building in Portage la Prairie on August 15th and included sponsors; Dairy Farmers of Manitoba,

Manitoba Canola Growers Association and Agriculture and Agri-food Canada.



6. FUN FEST

The 3rd Annual Manitoba 4-H Fun Fest was held in Carman at the Dufferin Agricultural Society grounds from July 9-11, 2014. Scheduled to coincide with the Carman Country Fair, 61 members participated in this year's event. In addition to the horse, beef and dairy shows, Fun Fest offered a day of competition solely for multi-purpose members, plus a series of games based on Minute to Win It and a Tug-O-War competition which proved to be very popular. Of the members who attended, 20 were dairy members, 22 were equine members, 15 were beef members and four were from multi-purpose clubs. The most coveted Fun Fest prize was a trip to the 4-H Pro Show in Nova Scotia in September. All members were invited to submit an entry that explained "Why I love 4-H". Each of the entrants also went through an interview process. At the finale, Amanda McCullough, a senior member from the Graysville Beef Club was announced as the winner. Several other awards were presented during the three-day event.

The winners for the Livestock Judging Competition were Chris Jermey (Senior), Justin DeRuiter (Intermediate), Taylor Carlson (Junior) and Shaylee Frattiinger (Cloverbud). Tug of War medals were received by the Central Manitoba Dairy Club (gold), the Archie 4-H Light Horse Club (Silver) and the Elm Creek Beef Club (Bronze).

7. YOUNG HORSE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM (YHDP)

The North American Equine Ranching Information Council (NAERIC) partners to provide a venue for senior 4-H members to demonstrate their knowledge gained through the 4-H Equine Project and to showcase the stock being bred and raised on Manitoba's equine ranches. Participating Manitoba ranchers offer young stock for 4-H members to inspect, select, purchase, raise and train. Members (minimum 14 years) apply to participate in the project and are selected by the YHDP Advisory Committee (representatives from MAFRD, NAERIC and a 4-H

Leader). This two year project requires 4-H members to set goals, take responsibility and apply their new knowledge. Five members were enrolled in the second year (attending the Under Saddle Presentation) and five members were working with foals to prepare for a Yearling Presentation.

8. Provincial Communications



On Saturday, April 26th, 2014 at the Victoria Inn, Winnipeg, Manitoba, 90 4-H members participated in the Provincial 4-H Communications Extravaganza. These members had risen to the top through a series of competitions from club level to area levels across the province. The provincial 4-H communications competition is offered jointly by Manitoba 4-H Council and Manitoba Agriculture, Food and Rural Development.

Members competed in the following categories: Junior, Intermediate, Senior and Adult Speeches, Junior, Intermediate and Senior One-Person Visual Presentations and Junior, Intermediate and Senior Two-Person Visual Presentations.

An awards reception and presentation followed each competition session.

Approximately 450 people attended the Provincial Communications Extravaganza. Thank you to the committee volunteers – Ken Essex, Julie Labossiere and Shirley Warelis-Thompson – as well as the judges and other volunteers for a job well done.

1. CANADIAN 4-H COUNCIL

Canadian 4-H Council had several staffing changes during the year

Erin Smith was promoted into the position of Program Director. As well, Jessie Christie was hired as Marketing and Communications Coordinator and Melina Found as Program Coordinator.

Heidi Vallinga was hired as Fund Development Coordinator and Scott Westlake was hired as interim Fund Development Manager.

Emily Brown (former ED of PEI 4-H) was hired as Program Manager.

C4HC national development/programs impact

4-H Youth Exchanges Canada travel was postponed to 2015. However, 100 Chrysler Centennial scholarships (100 @ \$1,000) were awarded to members across the country.

Year one of a three-year offering of the Larry Milton Campbell scholarships was awarded and announced. Congratulations to Manitoba member and M4HC Board Director Hayley Schuddemat, one of the two Canadian recipients. The new John Deere national scholarships (15 @ \$2,000) were awarded also awarded to four Manitoba recipients – Laura Horner, Amy Pizzey, Cassie Scott and Rachel Verwey.

Aside from Scholarships, The Enbridge Card Campaign was completed as the last major Centennial initiative. 200 entries were received.

The SeCan Grow a Leader campaign was launched for Ontario, Manitoba and Quebec: all major soybean growing regions in Canada.

The Syngenta Proud to BEE a 4-H'er campaign was launched across Canada.

Other important announcements are as follows:

 An inaugural National Leaders Summit was held in Ottawa in February 2014, with plans to

- be an annual program focused on training for provincial supervisors and leaders
- C4HC worked with a number of scientists across the country, via funding support through an NSERC grant, to conduct a Measures of Success III survey

Changes in federal legislation for non-profit organizations, which no longer allow for appointments to Canadian 4-H Council, as well as a review of the latest structure of the Youth Advisory Committee, prompted the design of a new structure for YAC. This new structure divides committee representatives into four working groups (as seen in the attached diagram), which members will sit on for one year terms. These working groups will allow for members to: fill an advisory role in the development of new programs and resources, plan and facilitate conferences and represent/promote 4-H Canada and its programs. Along with four to six conference calls that will allow working groups to report to the committee as a whole and for members to hear updates from 4-H Canada and 4-H Canada Council, the YAC will have an annual meeting at the National 4 -H Leadership Summit in February. Chair and secretary positions will rotate through the membership. The committee will receive increased support and guidance from 4-H Canada, through the 4-H Canada Program Manager (Erin Smith), as well as from the Canadian 4-H Council through the Canadian 4-H Council Member mentor position (Jennifer Bishop). It is the hope that with this new structure, the Youth Advisory Committee will be able to thrive into the future and contribute positively to the Canadian 4-H Program.

The structure was finalized at the 2014 National Leadership Summit in Ottawa. Having been selected at the end of January 2014, I was one of the seven YAC members that was able to attend. A conference call was held May 16, 2014. Working group activity was reported and the national AGM report was prepared. Marketing & Communications will welcome new members.

An information package was developed, then distributed to all provinces in June 2014. A standard application form, standard selection criteria and provincial involvement ideas were included.

Membership terms will last two years with the possibility of renewal for one or two additional years. Extension must be agreed upon by both the provincial 4-H office and/or council and 4-H Canada. A dismissal policy was also included. YAC members are expected to pay the \$25 4-H Canada youth membership fee. Provinces may cover this for their YAC representative.

EASTMAN

NORTH PARKLAND

The North Parkland Area 4-H Council had 17 clubs in 2013-14, with 207 members and 92 leaders. The council has continued its close working relationship with the agricultural societies in the area. 
Valleys North Communication event was held on March 18th in Swan River and The Pas was able to take part with their 2 speech winners competing via video-taped and YouTube links. Worked great!



MAFRD Partnership

The GO Teams Branch provides support to the delivery of the 4-H program throughout Manitoba and to the Board functions and development of Manitoba 4-H Council.

Key involvement this year included the Manitoba—Japan Homestay Program, Future Leader Club development, Aboriginal Club Development, Leader Training and ongoing resource support to M4HC staff, committees and events. MAFRD is represented on the Manitoba 4-H Council Board by the RLS - Senior 4-H and Youth, Leanne Sprung and Meghan Sprung, the RLS – 4-H and Youth. Each MAFRD GO Team assigns a staff member to serve as a MAFRD Area 4-H Council Liaison and on the 4-H Program Delivery Team. The

New Directions for 4-H Projects initiative released the Mastering Beef Project (Time to Specialize), Discovering Crafts, Foods, Body Works and Leadership Projects, Outdoor Living and the Equine Series (Exploring Horses 1-3, Pick a Topic, Discover Equine – Time to Specialize, Dismounted Skills Guide).

"How To Work With Cloverbuds" and Canned Presentations were developed and made available to 4-H leaders. In addition, 15 PowerPoint presentations were revised and updated and the 4-H Reorganization Packages began a revised format for 2014.

Each 4-H Member donates \$1.00 to the Foundation as part of the annual \$50.00 membership fee to the Manitoba 4-H Council. Additional 4-H Club donations come from a portion of the money received for participating in the annual Highway Clean-up Campaign or other club fund raising activities.

At the Annual Meeting a percentage of the Foundation's earnings are calculated to provide Manitoba 4-H Council support to ongoing programs. In 2013, that amounted to \$11,187 towards Council programs.

The Foundation's fiscal year is January 1 to December 31. (The Council's fiscal year is September 1 to August 31.)
